

Morpheus

This is a triangle scarf knitted from right to left (or vice versa). You can use virtually any yarn you wish to replicate this pattern.

Materials Used: #17 Needles

Gauge: Unimportant

Row 1: CO 1

Row 2: Inc in first st by knitting into the front & back of stitch, K to end of row

Row 3: Slip first st as if to Purl, K to end of row

Repeat rows 2 & 3 until the point of the triangle is the length desired. (at least 24 inches)

(It is important to note that some yarns will stretch further once the piece is done, depending on their makeup and the openness of the pattern, where as, chunky yarns will not do this. It will be important to understand this to reproduce the effect you want in your garment.)

Now you will begin to decrease:

Row 1: K2tog then K to end of row.

Row 2: Slip first st as if to Purl, K to end of row.

Repeat rows 1 & 2 until you have 2 sts left.

Last row: K2tog & fasten off.

Add 6-8 inch fringe along the two edges. Railroad Ribbon yarn, such as Eros, works beautifully for this.

Make another triangle in the same way.

Now comes the fun part...

Using ribbon or decorative buttons, you can "temporarily" connect the two triangles together in different configurations.

You can connect the two triangles together across the long edge leaving enough room in the middle to slip the garment over your head, making a beautiful poncho/

OR

Connect the two triangles half way along the two longest edges or connect two sides and use as a shawl. When connecting the two sides, the fringe makes a beautiful embellishment down the back of the shawl.

OR

Connect both pieces all the way across the long edge and use as a doubled shawl.

OR

Use one triangle as a scarf. Depending on the drape, you can wear this scarf many ways.
